Bulletin Cover and Installations

In Exodus 13:21, God leads his people with a cloud by day. To illustrate this, artists from Redeemer have made many charcoal drawings and collaged in collaboration to create this cloud in the window. Charcoal is made in a similar fashion to the ashes used in our Ash Wednesday service. In our ashes we take the palms from last Palm Sunday and burn them to create the ash that makes up the cross drawn onto each forehead.

This use of liturgical symbols, colors, smells, and signs is not simply decorative but also gets into the thread of our lives and years.

Signs are reused and reshaped to remind us that God is working out his plan in us and at Redeemer. The mobiles from Advent are now filled with the curly (formerly pink) ribbons that now suggest clouds of God leading us through Lent by his Spirit and breath.

Besides being highly flammable, lint's ontogeny calls to mind the motif found in Genesis 3:19 and Ecclesiastes 3:20: "All are from the dust, and to dust all return."

The Power of a Name

Children's Worship is for ages 3 through kindergarten and is a time for children to worship through song, Bible stories, and response (art or story play). Children will return to the sanctuary before communion, and parents can pick them up at that time. Visitors are welcome, and parents are always invited to attend with their children.

Community Group Questions

- 1) When is a time in your life that God led you into something difficult? In what way(s) was he with you?
- 2) There are certain aspects of God's character that are less comfortable for us, e.g., his judgment of sin. What is a way that you want to cast God in your own image? How are the biblical descriptions of God ultimately better than a god we can make?
- 3) God swears himself to his people through irrevocable covenants, e.g., with Abraham, with Moses, with David, and with Jesus. "Irrevocable covenants" might be an abstract or archaic concept for us, but they are the arrangement God has provided in order for his Presence to abide with his people. As a community group, tease out a few practical implications of this biblical reality. In other words, how does it matter in your life that God has sworn himself to you?

Call to Communion and Prayer

Guidelines for the Reception of Communion

Redeemer welcomes all Christians who are willing to forsake their sin and trust in Jesus Christ for salvation and who are members of congregations which proclaim the gospel to receive Communion with us. We will be coming forward for the distribution of Communion. Please eat the bread privately, and then drink the cup together with us after everyone has returned to their seats. Clear cups (located in the interior rings) contain grape juice. Red cups (exterior ring of tray) contain wine. Children who have been interviewed by the elders are able to partake of Communion.

The ministry of prayer is one of the ways we live together as a community of believers and seekers. During Communion, members of our prayer team are available at the front of the sanctuary. It would be our privilege to pray with you as we walk together through the joys and struggles of life. We also encourage you to pray with one another in the pews during this time of movement in our service.

How We Welcome

As we work towards living out our mission of helping connect people to Jesus, the way we welcome people into life at Redeemer is a big part of that. How are we removing barriers to the Gospel? That's something we have to ask ourselves. We want everyone who walks through our doors to be quickly connected. We want them to feel wanted. We want them to be in-the-know.

If you've gone to Redeemer any amount of time, you know that some of the things that make this place unique can be barriers to a newcomer. Where do you park? How do you navigate this building? Where are the restrooms?

What we've done

In the last year, we've done some cool things that have helped! At our new Welcome Table, visitors can get connected to a member of our Welcome Team and learn about things that are happening in the life of the church. (They even get a bag of Tinker coffee as a way to say, "Hey, we're glad you visited us today!") Have you noticed the big blue wayfinding signs? We had a team of consultants come and work with us on how to make our building more easy-to-navigate, and those signs have played a big part in that.

What's coming

We're constantly thinking through ways to improve all of these things. This year, we'll be rolling out a new parking system, with parking wayfinding signs and a parking team. We'll be recruiting people to be a concierge team for guests, helping them with things like finding where to take their kids, getting a donut, finding the restrooms, and answering questions they may have. We'd also like to have hosts in the Harrison Gallery during the middle hour: smiling faces that will help that space be warm and inviting to someone who may be visiting alone or for their first time.

You have a role to play

This month, as we've focused on serving and have gotten a glimpse into the different roles involved in the ministries here, we hope you've been able to think through the ways you and your family can be more involved here. If you call Redeemer home, we hope you'll find a place to serve.

As we launch the Parking, Concierge, and Host teams, maybe think about how you could serve in one of those roles. We need people who can help families sign their kids in on a Sunday morning. We need people who will hold umbrellas and walk with guests from our parking lots into the building. We need people who have a heart for hospitality and helping people feel welcome.


Women, join us for our next OneRead



Membership is meaningful in multiple ways. First, we believe that as Christians, it is a part of our calling to be active and engaged in the Church. When you become a member, you take public vows to confirm your faith in Christ and commit to his Church. These vows submit members to the leadership and discipline of the church. We submit ourselves to accountability just like in marriage, friendship, citizenship, and any other relationship or institution that we enter into.

Membership also allows you certain benefits. Members in good standing are able to vote on church matters. They elect elders, call pastors, and have a say in other church business.
