Exodus 18:1-27

Reader

- 1 Now Jethro, the priest of Midian and father-in-law of Moses, heard of everything God had done for Moses and for his people Israel, and how the LORD had brought Israel out of Egypt.

- <sup>9</sup> Jethro was delighted to hear about all the good things the LORD had done for Israel in rescuing them from the hand of the Egyptians. 10 He said, "Praise be to the LORD, who rescued you from the hand of the Egyptians and of Pharaoh, and who rescued the people from the hand of the Egyptians. 11 Now I know that the LORD is greater than all other gods, for he did this to those who had treated Israel arrogantly." 12 Then Jethro, Moses' father-in-law, brought a burnt offering and other sacrifices to God, and Aaron came with all the elders of Israel to eat a meal with Moses' father-in-law in the presence of God.
- <sup>13</sup> The next day Moses took his seat to serve as judge for the people, and they stood around him from morning till evening. 14 When his father-in-law saw all that Moses was doing for the people, he said, "What is this you are doing for the people? Why do you alone sit as judge, while all these people stand around you from morning till evening?"
- <sup>15</sup> Moses answered him, "Because the people come to me to seek God's will. <sup>16</sup> Whenever they have a dispute, it is brought to me, and I decide between the parties and inform them of God's decrees and instructions."
- <sup>17</sup> Moses' father-in-law replied, "What you are doing is not good. <sup>18</sup> You and these people who come to you will only wear yourselves out. The work is too heavy for you; you cannot handle it alone. 19 Listen now to me and I will give you some advice, and may God be with you. You must be the people's representative before God and bring their disputes to him. 20 Teach them his decrees and instructions, and show them the way they are to live and how they are to behave. 21 But select capable men from all the people men who fear God, trustworthy men who hate dishonest gain—and appoint them as officials over thousands, hundreds, fifties and tens. 22 Have them serve as judges for the people at all times, but have them bring every difficult case to you; the simple cases they can decide themselves. That will make your load lighter, because they will share it with you. <sup>23</sup> If you do this and God so commands, you will be able to stand the strain, and all these people will go home satisfied." 7

# **Community Group Questions**

- 1) What do Moses and Jethro focus on in their conversation in Exodus 18:8-11? How does that fit into the storyline of Exodus (look at Exodus 9:13-16)? How does that fit into the larger storyline of Scripture (see, for example, Revelation 5:9-13)? How can the pattern of Moses telling Israel's story (especially 18:8) set a pattern for us telling our story?
- 2) Many of us have experienced hurt from institutions and structures that misuse power or seem to serve themselves rather than people. But how can a lack of institutions and structures actually be hurtful to us? What does the experience of Moses and the Israelites in Exodus 18:13-18 teach us?
- 3) How is the grace of the gospel related to institutions and structures for God's people? Put another way, what's the relationship in Exodus 18 between the focus of verses 1-12 and the focus of verses 13-27?
- 4) How can you lean into the importance of institutions in God's plan for his people? What's one way that you can apply this passage in your attitudes and practice?

#### Children's Question:

What is Moses's job in this chapter (read Exodus 18:15-16 and 19-20)? How does his job relate to God? How does his job relate to the Israelites? How does Moses' job help us think about Jesus' job and how we trust Jesus?

# **Call to Communion and Prayer**

#### Guidelines for the Reception of Communion

Redeemer welcomes all Christians who are willing to forsake their sin and trust in Jesus Christ for salvation and who are members of congregations which proclaim the gospel to receive Communion with us. We will be coming forward for the distribution of Communion. Please eat the bread privately, and then drink the cup together with us after everyone has returned to their seats. Clear cups (located in the interior rings) contain grape juice. Red cups (exterior ring of tray) contain wine. Children who have been interviewed by the elders are able to partake of Communion.

The ministry of prayer is one of the ways we live together as a community of believers and seekers. During Communion, members of our prayer team are available at the front of the sanctuary. It would be our privilege to pray with you as we walk together through the joys and struggles of life. We also encourage you to pray with one another in the pews during this time of movement in our service.


#### Kids, Register Now! Gospel Music Camp is coming to Redeemer!




