Community Group Questions

- 1) Take time to consider why God calls for such an extreme punishment to be given to those who murder. What is the biblical reason for capital punishment? How might this be encouraging and/or discouraging?
- 2) In what ways does the notion of capital punishment strike you? We all want justice, but what keeps us from trusting that God is just, opting instead for our being the judge? What does is look like for you to trust God as the judge? What's it going to take for you to get there?

Children's Questions

Our scripture today talks about some pretty hard things that kids can do and say to their parents. While, hopefully, none of you have tried to hurt your parents so that they would die, we all do and say some really mean things to our moms and dads. Why do we do this? Do we really want to hurt our parents like this? If yes, why? If no, do you have an idea as to how we might not do this? Why is it not good for us to do this? (see Matthew 5:21-22) How might understanding about and trusting in Jesus help us to not do this?

Call to Communion and Prayer

Guidelines for the Reception of Communion

Redeemer welcomes all Christians who are willing to forsake their sin and trust in Jesus Christ for salvation and who are members of congregations which proclaim the gospel to receive Communion with us. We will be coming forward for the distribution of Communion. Please eat the bread privately, and then drink the cup together with us after everyone has returned to their seats. Clear cups (located in the interior rings) contain grape juice. Red cups (exterior ring of tray) contain wine. Children who have been interviewed by the elders are able to partake of Communion.

The ministry of prayer is one of the ways we live together as a community of believers and seekers. During Communion, members of our prayer team are available at the front of the sanctuary. It would be our privilege to pray with you as we walk together through the joys and struggles of life. We also encourage you to pray with one another in the pews during this time of movement in our service.

Sabbatical Report

This summer my family and I were blessed to have a three-month sabbatical for rest and rejuvenation. I want to personally thank David Maurer who did an excellent job filling in for me. Knowing that my job was covered allowed me to fully disconnect from my work and engage with my sabbatical.

Stepping away from my ministry at Redeemer allowed me to see more clearly the levels of stress and fatigue I was carrying. I was confronted with the ways in which I had put on a "works-based righteousness" approach to my ministry – I could work harder and better and carry everything on my back.

In Luke 13 Jesus talks about Jerusalem and says, "How often have I longed to gather your children together, as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings..." The image of God as a mother hen became a recurring theme during my sabbatical. A mother hen is both loving toward her chicks and aggressive toward predators. This became an image of healing for me. My God is a mother hen who loves me, who will fight for me, and who wants me to rely on him instead of my own abilities. This is something I hope to carry with me into the future.





I also ended sabbatical with a renewed sense of calling to my work at Redeemer. We are part of a larger denomination, the Presbyterian Church in America (PCA). While I appreciate many things about the PCA, it can sometimes be an awkward fit for me as a pastor. As I wrestled with what it meant to be in the PCA, I kept coming back to one core truth – I loved and missed Redeemer. This is the church where I am called to serve. This is the church where my family and I are known and loved. This is the church where God ministers to me just as much if not more than I minister to others.

I am excited to be back, to reengage with the work God has for me, and to see what he has in store for this next chapter at Redeemer.


